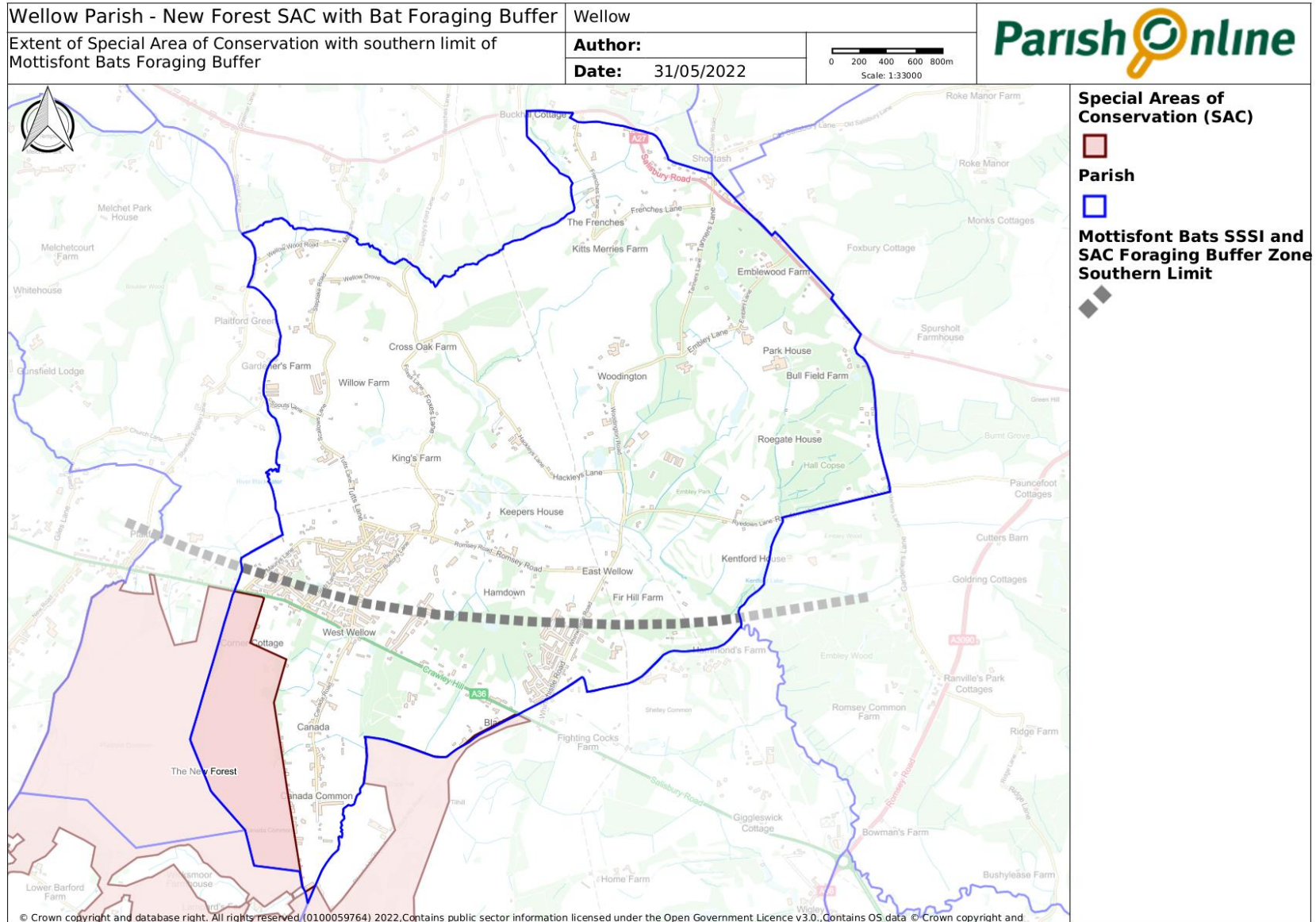

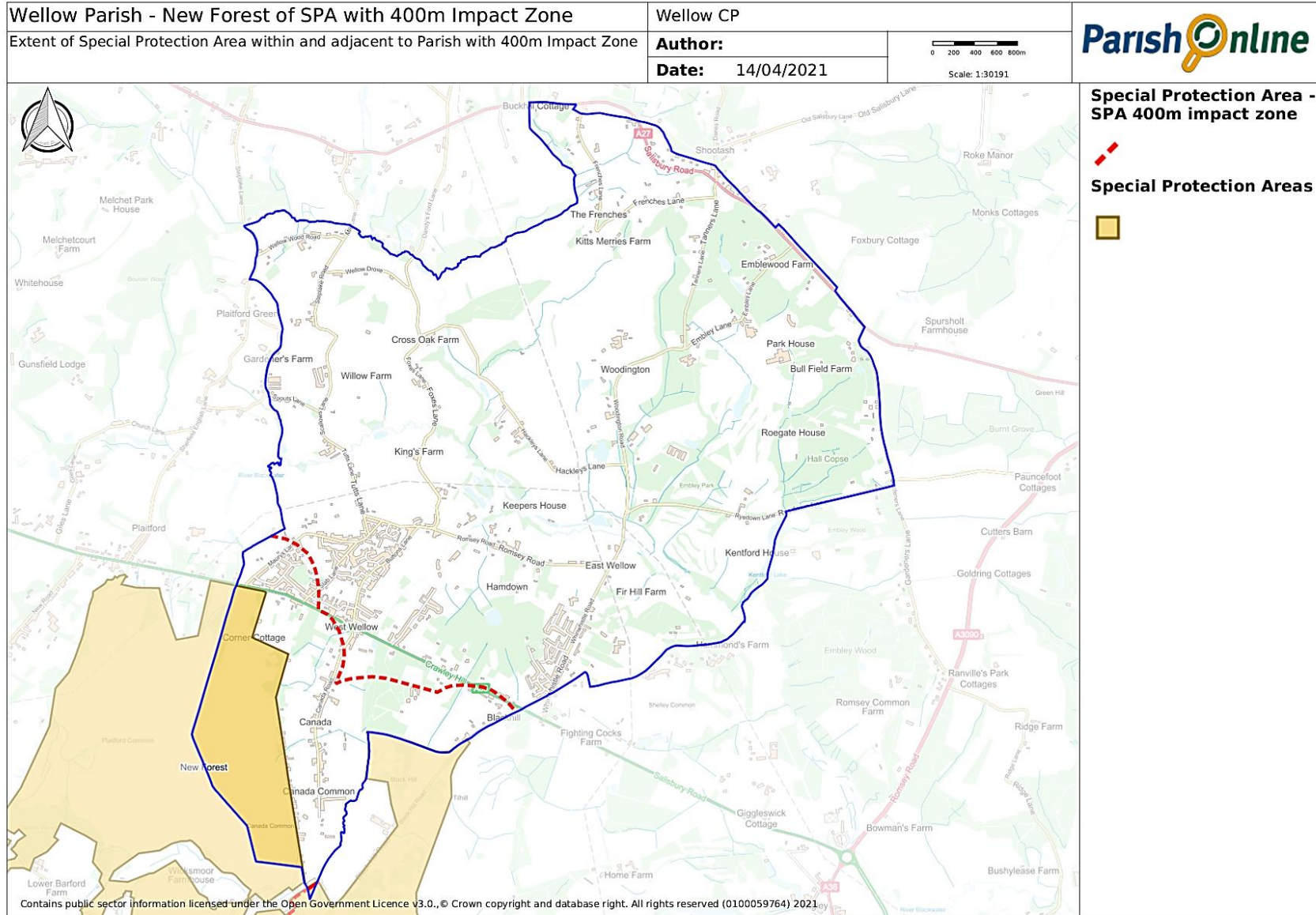

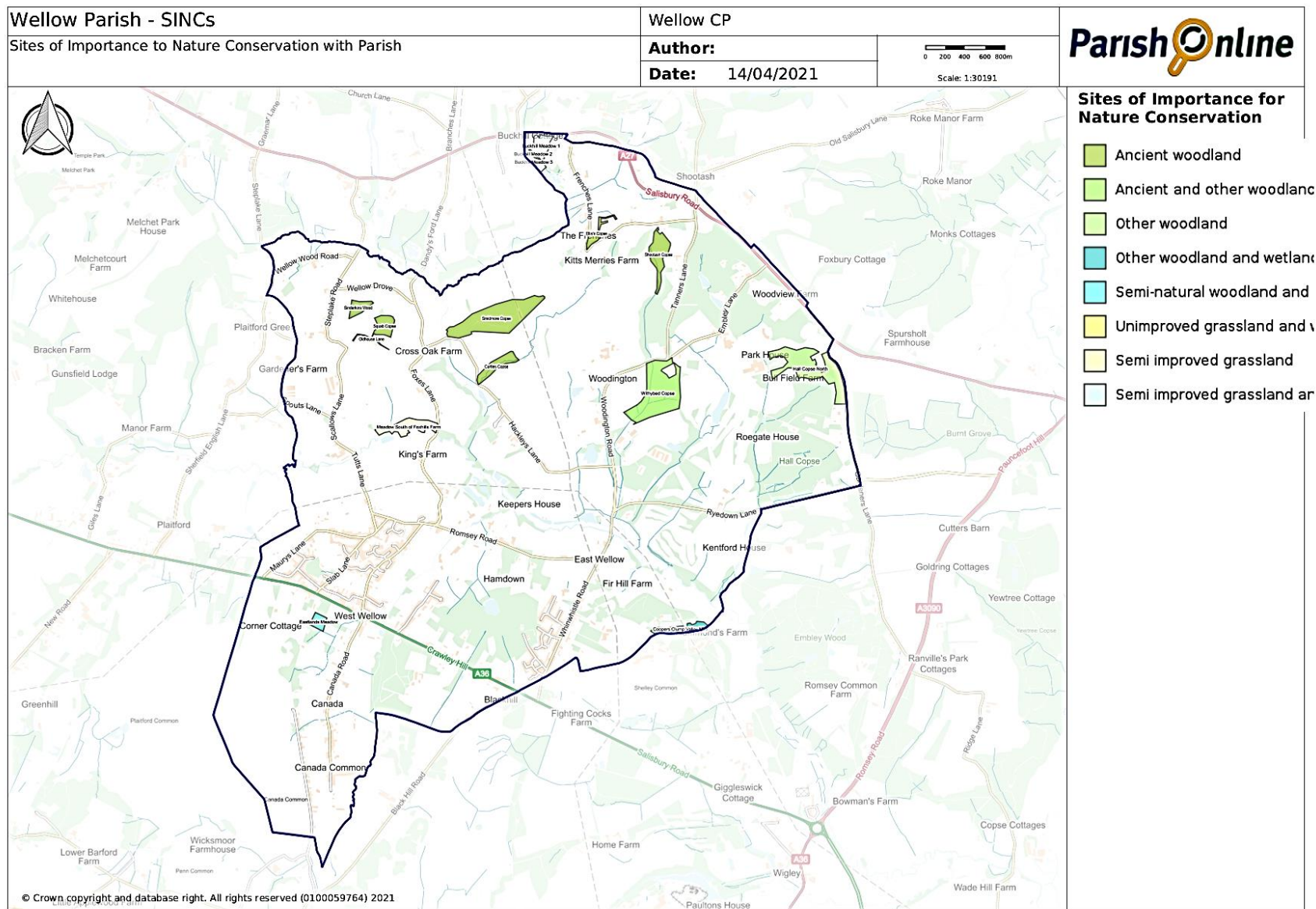

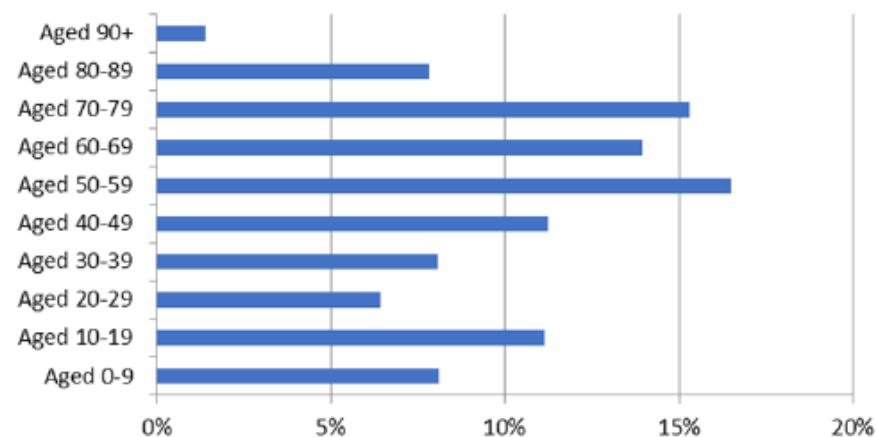

Age profile

Key characteristics:

- Wellow has a smaller percentage of **young people** (aged 0-19) than the Borough average of 22.8%
- By 2025, the proportion of young people will decrease to 19.7% and will then be 4.3% lower than the Borough average
- Wellow has a smaller percentage of **young adults** (aged 20-39) than the Borough average of 19.9%
- Proportion of young adults is expected to remain steady between 2020 and 2025
- **Middle aged** residents (aged 40-69) are 41.7% of Wellow's population, slightly higher than the Borough average of 40.2%. This is forecast to decrease slightly to 40.2% by 2025
- Wellow has a significantly higher percentage of those **aged 70 and over** at 24.6%, 7.4% above the Borough average. By 2025, this percentage is forecast to increase by 1.6%, a rate similar to that of the Borough.

Percentage of the population by age group 2020



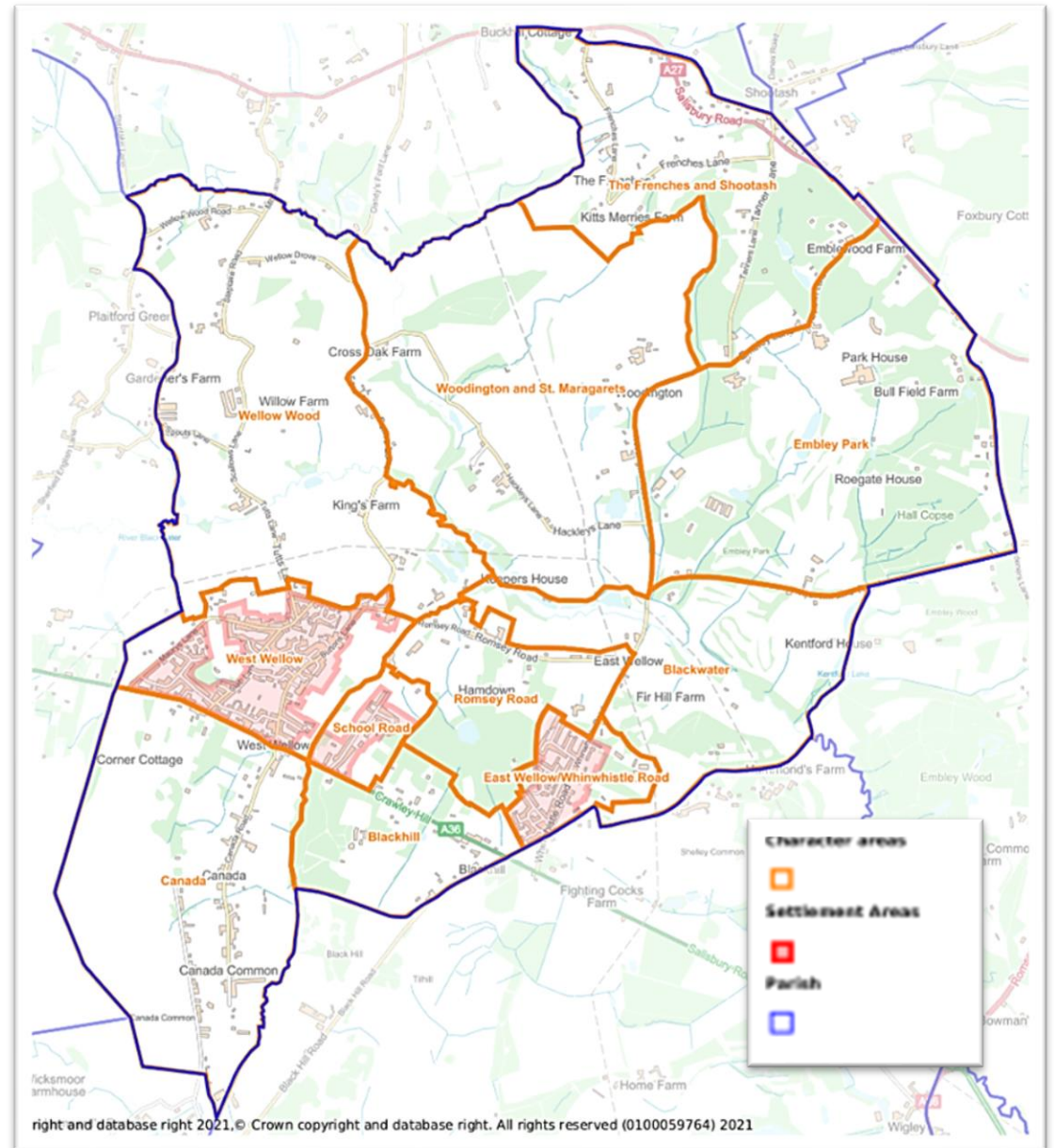

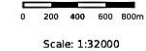
- Half the population of the Parish lives in the Settlement Areas of West Wellow and School Road, a further 15% live in East Wellow
- The less settled areas of Canada, Blackhill and Romsey Road adjacent to the Settled Areas account for a further 17%
- The remaining 18% live north of these areas in 60% of the area of the Parish
- Average densities vary from nearly 18/ha in West Wellow, 0.3 in rural parts of the Parish. The average density 2.16/ha



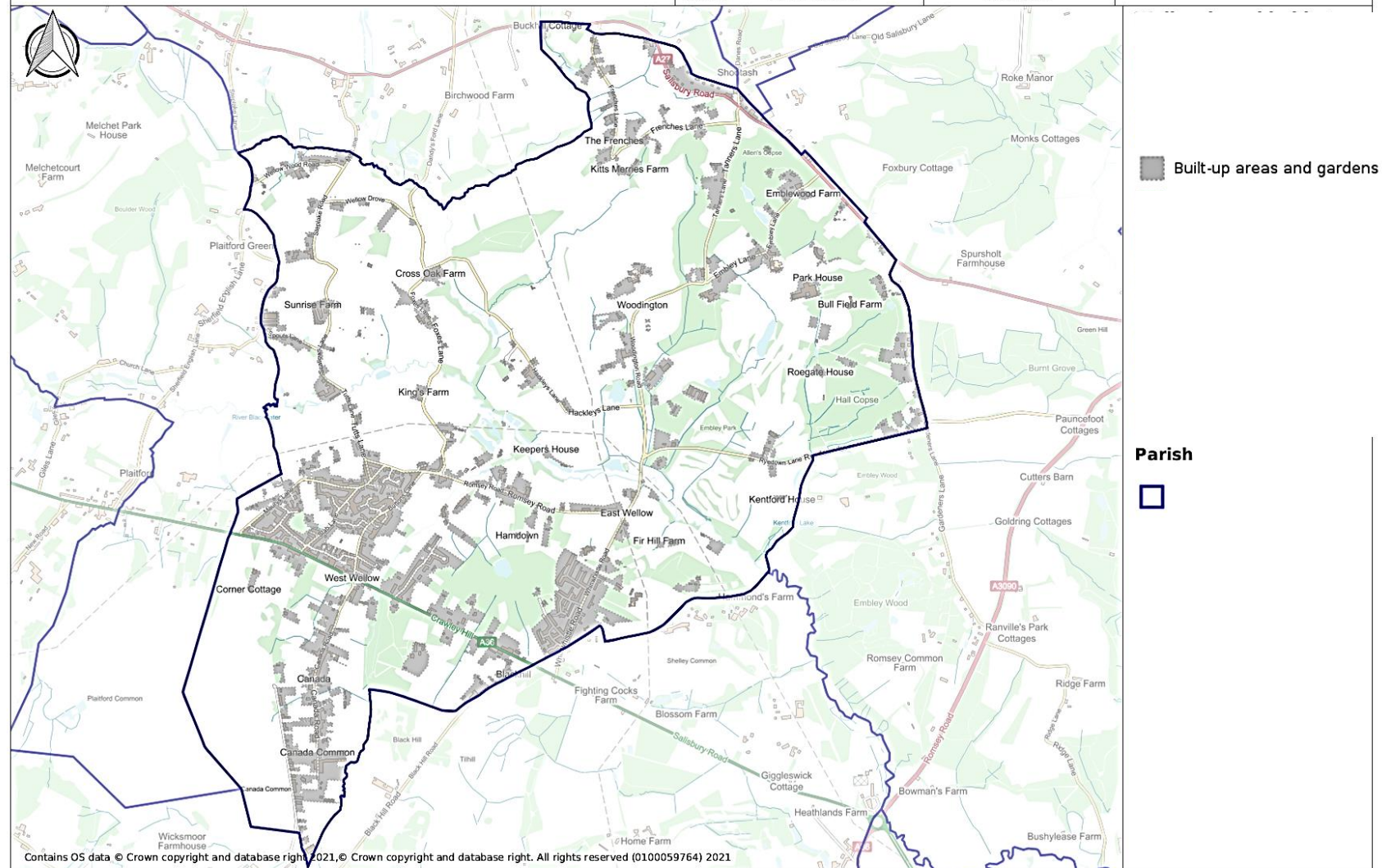
Extent of built up areas in Parish. Includes houses, gardens, farm buildings, schools and business and industrial premises

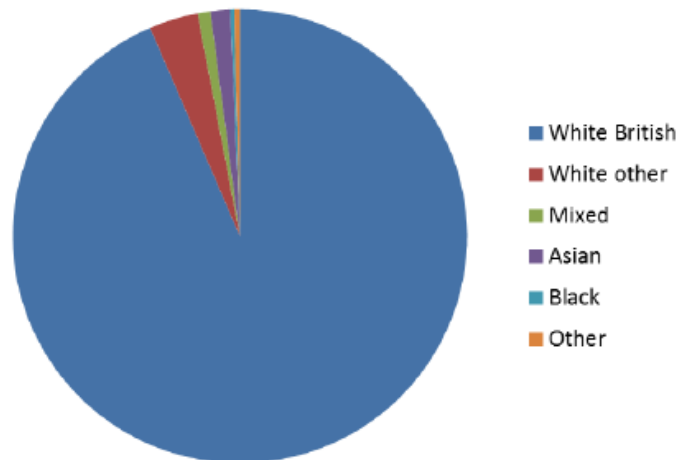

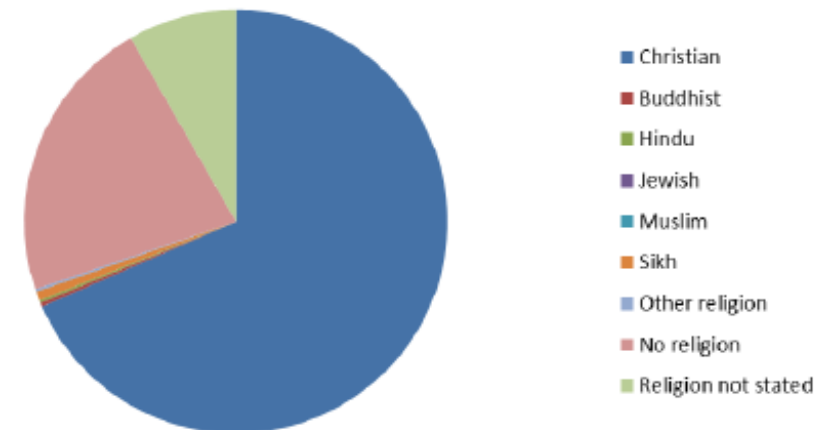

Ethnicity of Wellow residents

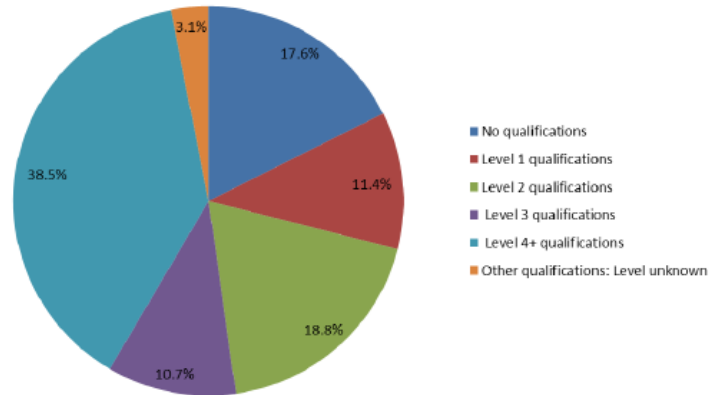


Religion in Wellow

- 17.6% of Wellow residents between 16 and 74 have no academic, vocational or professional qualifications – 0.8% lower than the Borough average
- 38.5% of Wellow residents have a level 4 qualification (equivalent to at least an undergraduate degree or above) – higher than the Borough average of 30.5%

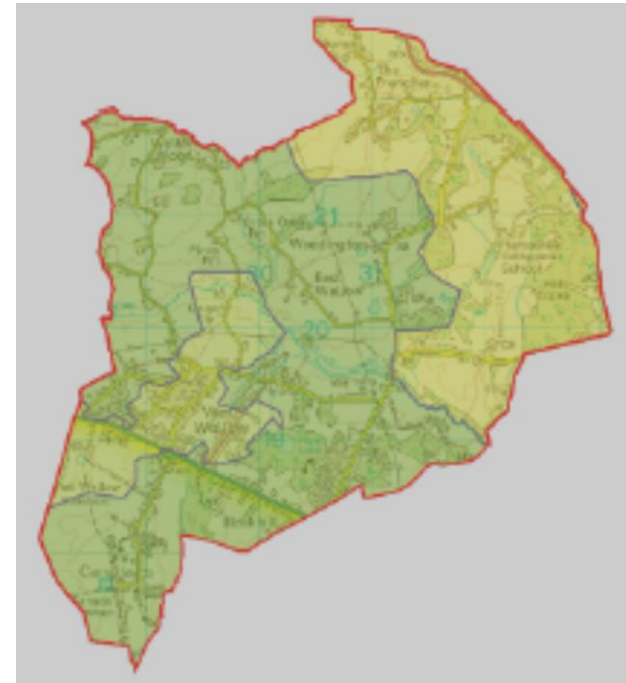
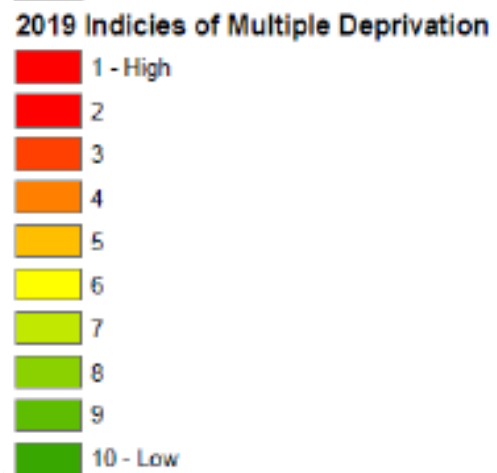
Key characteristics

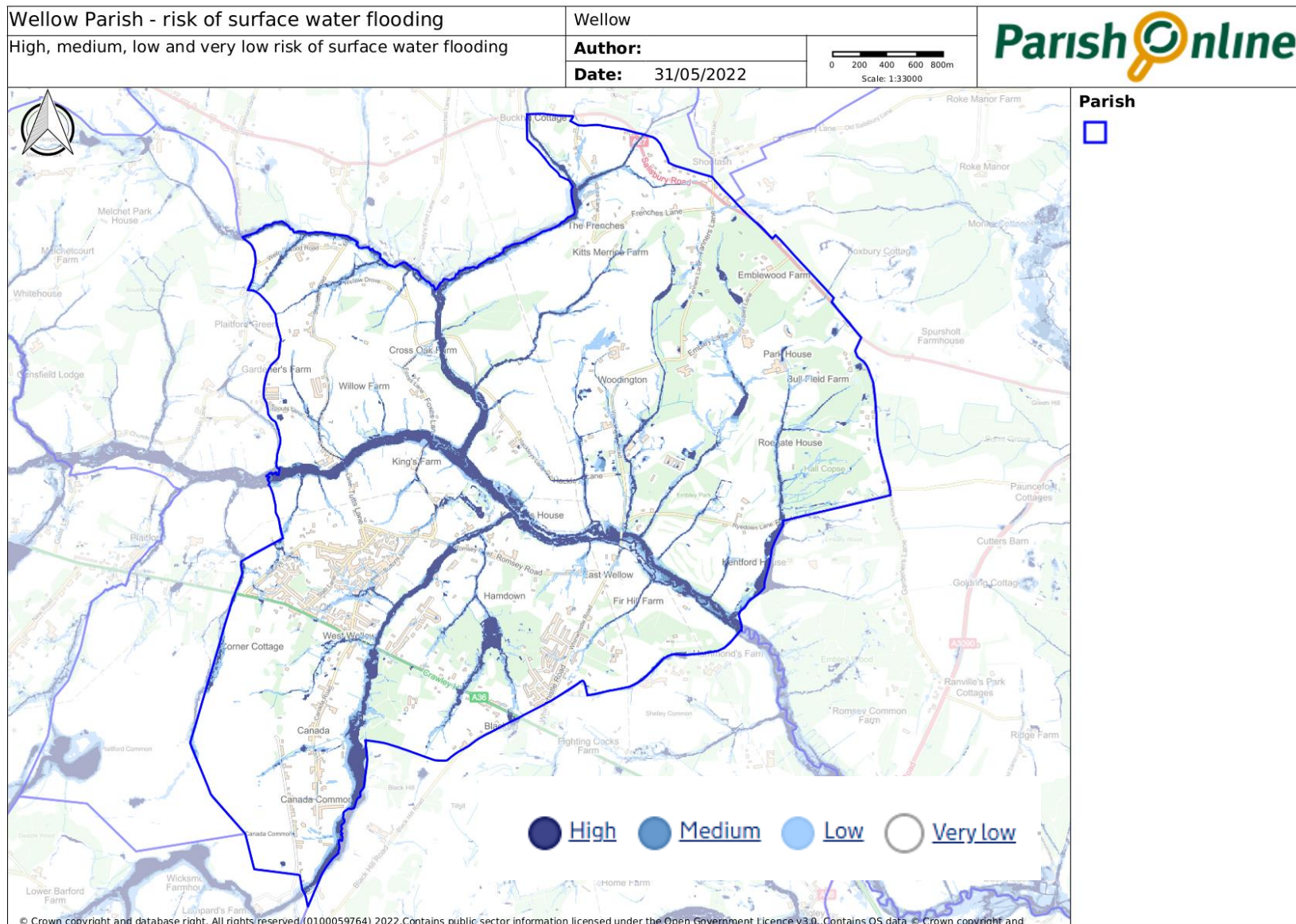

6. Air quality

There is little information on air quality that is specific to Wellow Parish.

Reports from Test Valley Borough Council (TVBC) do not contain information relating to Wellow and no instrumental monitoring appears to have taken place in Wellow. Pollution ratings are on a scale of from 1 – good to 6 – heavily polluted

Pollution ratings for postcodes on the A36 and also one near the A27 are all “1” (see table below) and are no higher than for those away from the main roads.

A rating of 1 means there is a low chance of average nitrogen dioxide levels exceeding the annual legal limit. The air in the area is generally clean, although *there may still be some high concentrations of NO₂ located close to major roads* (italics added).

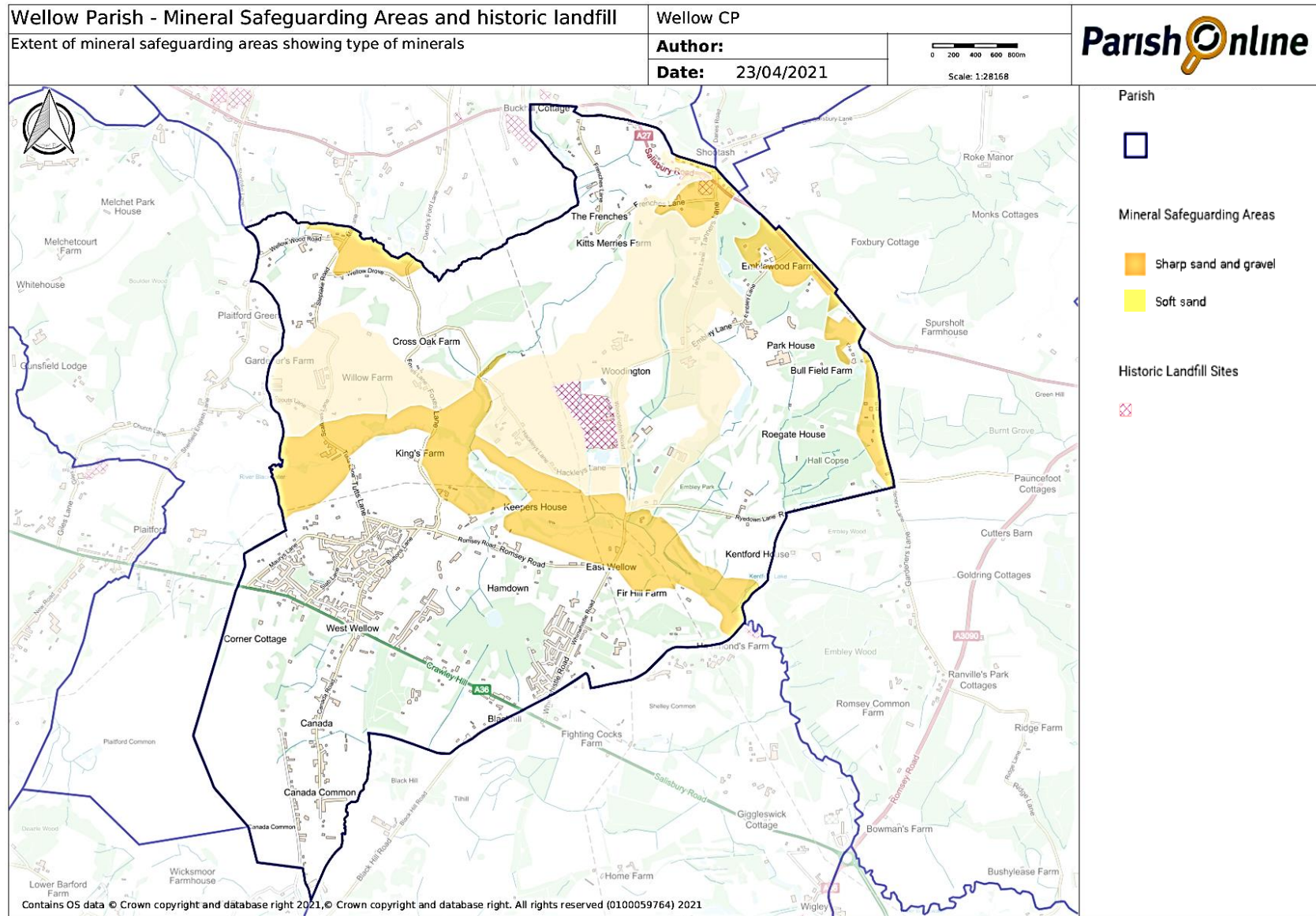
7. Climate

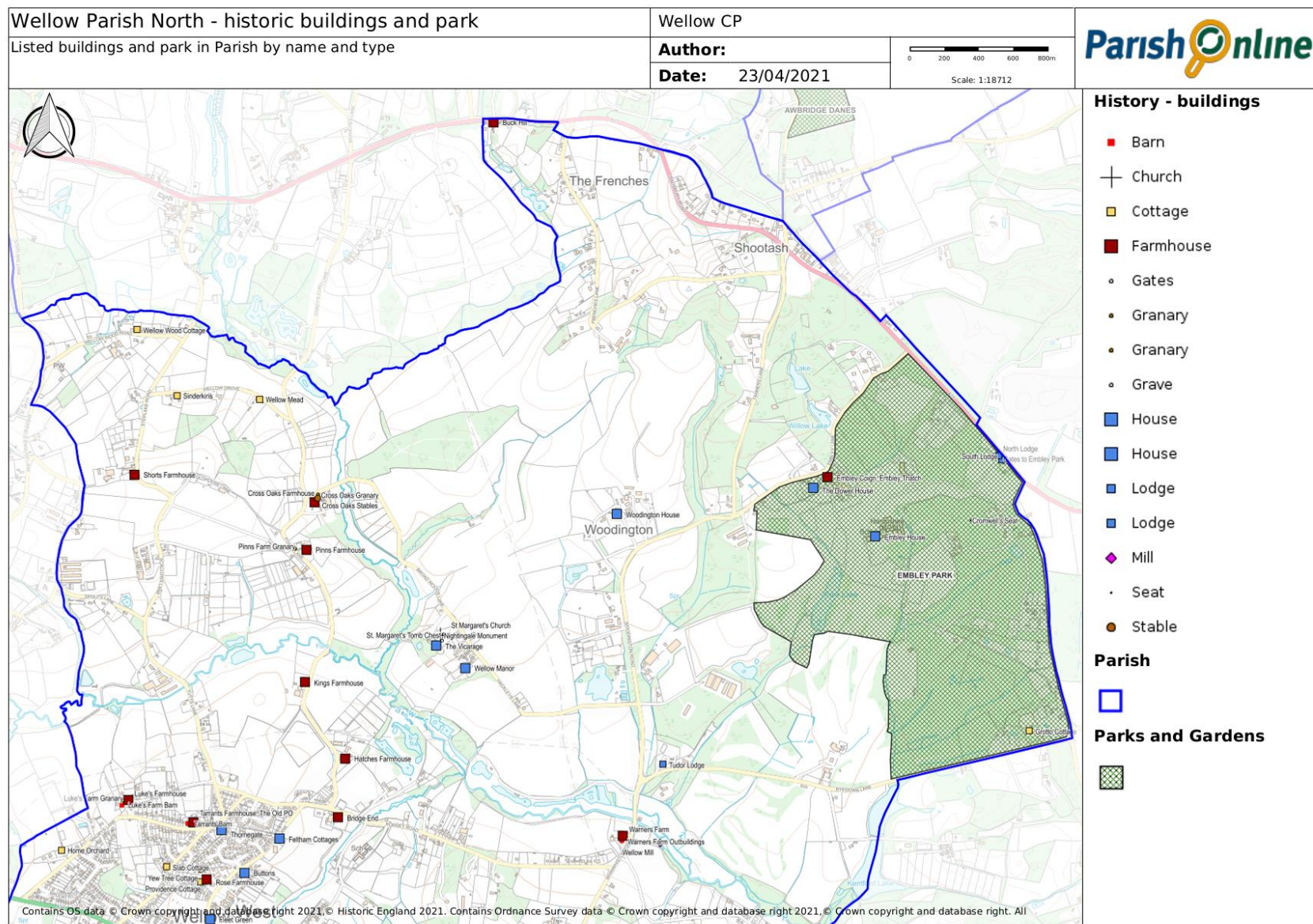

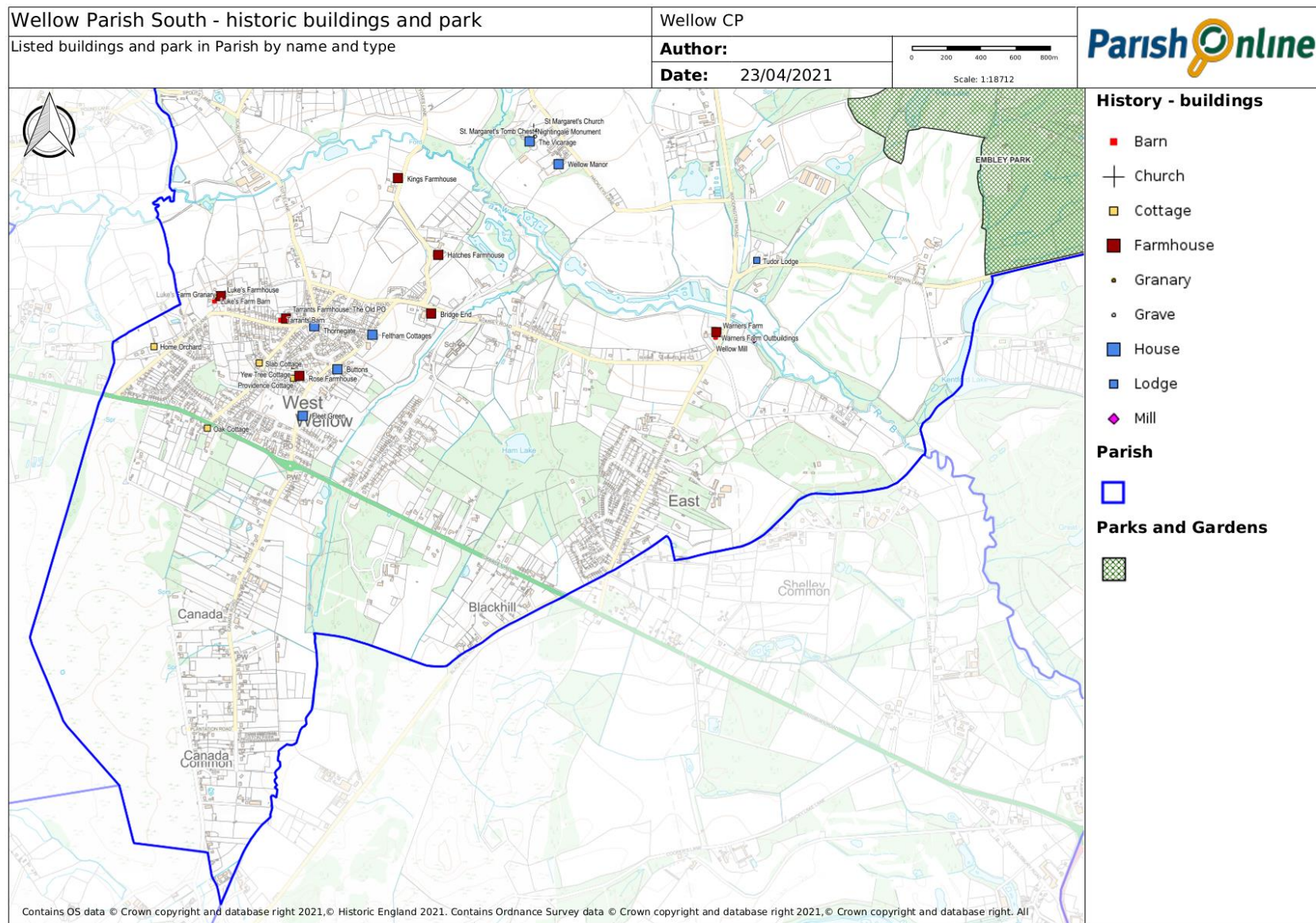

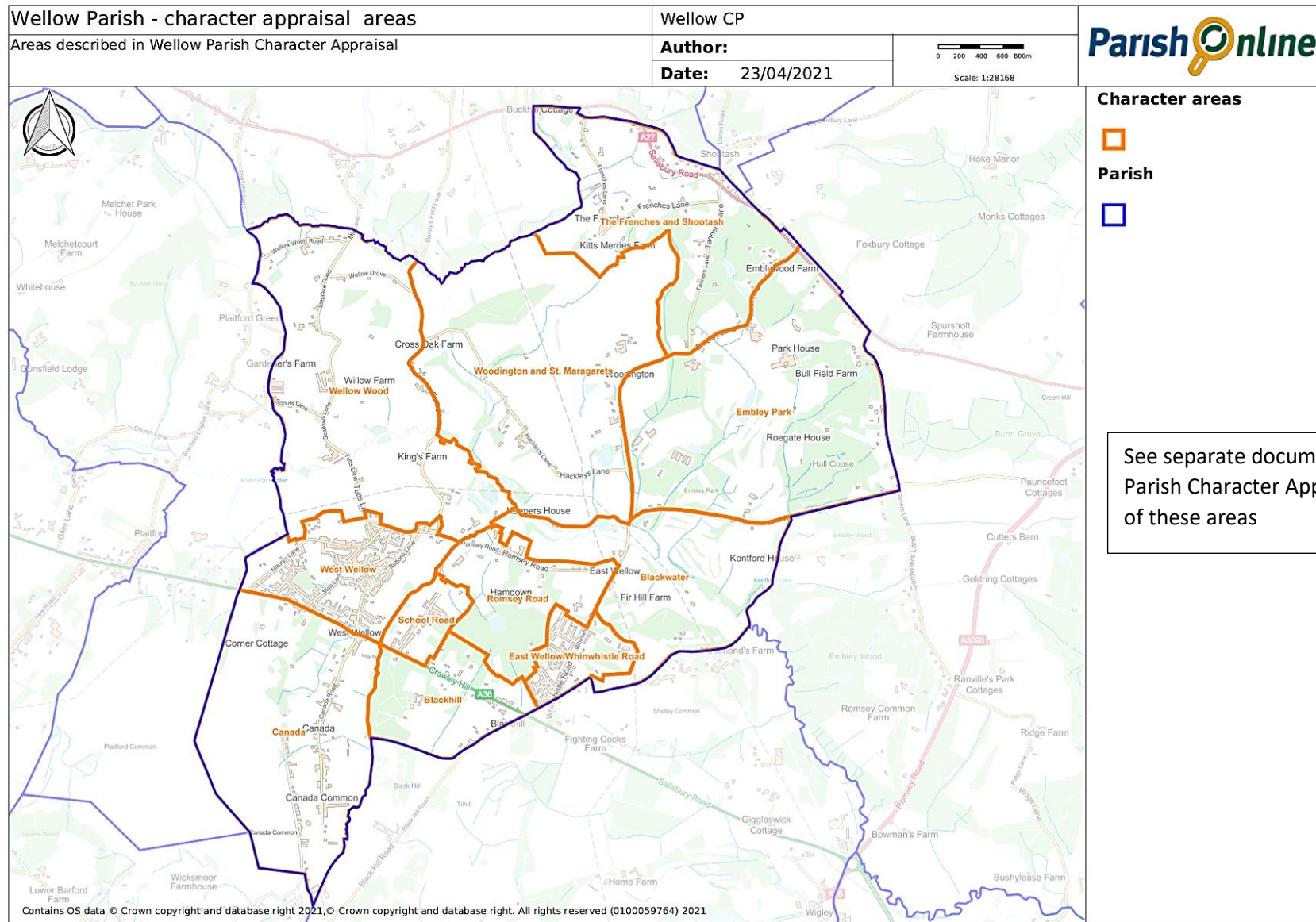

No significant earthworks e.g. tumuli or banks and ditches have been found or other prehistoric remains have been identified.

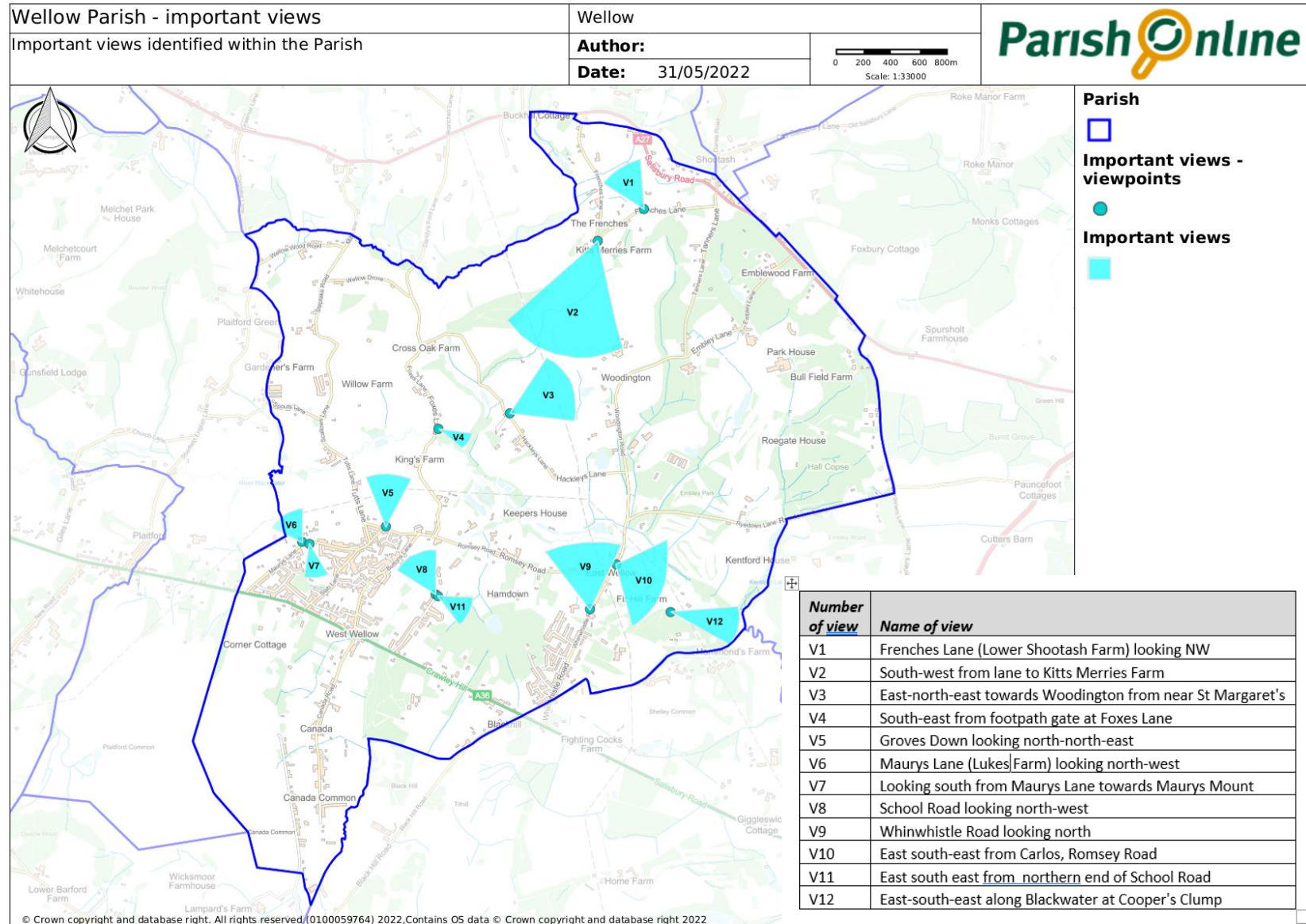
